#### 2016 Snack Bar Coverage Changes

Parents,

As you may already know, Media Little League is an all-volunteer organization. The Snack Bar is an integral piece of our financial success, which allows us to have the lowest registration fees and one of the nicest complexes in the region. In the past, we have heard from many of you that volunteering your time in the Snack Bar keeps you from seeing your child's games, and we have listened. For the 2016 season, we are implementing a new program to schedule parent volunteer time at the Snack Bar.:

- 1. Each team within the League will be scheduled for Snack Bar coverage 2 game slots during the season.
- 2. These time slots will be scheduled so that they do not conflict with your child's scheduled game times. This approach is one used by many other Leagues in the area and will greatly reduce the number of time slots each team (from 7 to 2) is responsible for coverage

Successful implementation of this approach will require that each of you work together with your Manager, Team Parent and the other parents on your child's team to make sure your assigned time slots are covered. Volunteering and teamwork are core values of Media Little League and Little League International. We are certain that all of us parents can work together to continue the successful operation of the Snack Bar, which is so integral to the success of Media Little League.














When I was younger and the news arrived that the Phillies had started spring training, one thing ricocheted through my mind, it was baseball season and Little League was right around the corner.

#### Three Generations of Media Little Leaguers

Throughout the history of Media Little League there have been a number of players whose fathers also played their youth baseball on the fields of Media. In the case of the Ryder family, not only did father Derek Ryder and sons, Will and Jack begin their baseball careers in Media Little League but the grandfather, Fred Ryder also graced our fields as a youngster. The family boasts considerable baseball prowess. Each generation of Ryders played for the 12 year old district tournament team and Derek went on to play baseball for Penn State and have a professional baseball career.

The past baseball season was a special one for all the Ryder men. Derek got to coach both of his sons, Will who played for American League team, Pazulski Carpet & Tile and Jack with Baker Printing. Grandpa Fred also volunteered his considerable baseball wisdom to the boy's teams and attended just about every game. Baseball didn't end after the playoffs for Fred, Derek and Jack as the trio kept the season going well into the summer as coaches and players for the 12 year old tournament team.



The senior Ryder, best known as Freddy, was actually a member of the storied 1957 Media tournament team. That team played for the state championship; a remarkable feat considering Media Little League was just founded only four years earlier in 1953. Freddy recalled, "I was a ten year old alternate on that team. Media was a great League in those days. Our field was Hess Field (located in the area now occupied by the Rose Tree Corporate Center) and it was the premier field in the district. There were only four teams in the Majors then, Upper Providence, Nether Providence, Media AA and Media JC." Freddy played for Media AA coached by Irv Malseed. Other star players of his era were Tim Malseed, Ronnie Powell, Mike Flanagan, Tom Peppler and Chubby Golatz. Twenty-odd years later, Freddy returned to MLL to coach his sons, Brett and Derek. Now he's in his third go around with MLL, this time as a grandfather. When asked about his experience this past season, Freddy replied, "It was awesome. The best part was getting to watch my son coach my grandsons. I also enjoyed helping out a bit here and there."

Derek and Jen Ryder have three children, sons Jack (12), Will (10) and daughter, Libby (7). When it came time for the family to move from

Havertown, the main goal was to get back to Derek roots in the Nether Providence area. "I have a lot of good memories of playing in Media and at Strath Haven High School", Derek explained.

As a nine year old little leaguer, Derek had the experience of facing a big league pitcher. The son of Phillies reliever Tug McGraw was a player in MLL at the time and Tug pitched batting practice to the boys. Derek went on to play for the MLL tournament team in 1984 and again in 1985. One of his teammates on those teams was Steve Grandizio who also played pro baseball. Other teammates and coaches that now have children playing in the league or volunteer their time include Mike Grace, Jamie Yannacone and George Plotts.

Success in Media Little League led to higher levels of baseball for Derek. In his senior year as the catcher for Penn State, Derek was drafted by the California Angels. He played for three years in the Angels system rising to the Double A level. He finished a five year pro career with the Chicago White Sox organization playing alongside many future big leaguers along the way.

When his boys started playing baseball, Derek thought he would enjoy just being a spectator. Somehow, he found himself as the manager of last year's 10 year old tournament team which, for those who are unfamiliar with the position, requires a major effort. This past season, Derek coached two regular season teams, followed by coaching the 12 year old tournament team. He also volunteers as a MLL board member. When asked how it happened that he left the casual comfort of the bleachers to return to the competitive arena, Derek replied, "My kids wanted me to coach. If they wanted me to do it, how could I say no to them?" He added, "I also hoped to help some young players to find the passion for the game that I developed under previous Media Little League volunteers."

When it comes to success on the baseball diamond, Jack and Will have a tough act to follow in their dad and grandfather, who they affectionately call "Big Daddy". When asked if there was any added pressure to be good at baseball like dad and Big Daddy, Will responded with the frank honesty of a nine year old, "No. I don't really care."

Jack and Will are aware that they are the third generation of Ryders in MLL. Both boys acknowledge this as being, "Pretty cool." Jack added, "I try to live up to their expectations. It motivates me." *Contibuted by Tony Antonello*
